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Cathedral Arts Project brings guest artist Christa Sylla to Salvation Army Child Development Center

On Monday, October 30, the Cathedral Arts Project hosted guest artist Christa Sylla at the Salvation Army Child Development Center as part of its Music & Movement class for 2-, 3- and 4-year-olds.

Sylla is a dancer, choreographer and educator who has shared the joy of cultural dance with the Jacksonville community for more than 13 years. She currently teaches West African dance for CAP at Highlands Elementary School and is also the director of Culture Moves 101 and an instructor at the Jacksonville Centre of the Arts.

Sylla and her assistant Nico Warren taught students the fundamentals of West African dancing and drumming. They learned the names, origins, pitches and make-up of African drums, and participated in a hands-on component that featured keeping tempo with one another. The students also learned and performed a West African dance combination with their friends and teachers.

CAP's Music & Movement class for early learners, which takes place at the Salvation Army Child Development Center every Tuesday and Thursday afternoon, is funded by the Chartrand Foundation. In addition to twice-weekly classes and guest artist visits, this partnership provides support materials that are provided to all students and families that participate. The class aims to harness the power of the arts to strengthen young children's cognitive, motor, language, social and emotional development.
